	<b>Course Description</b>	<p>This course is an overview of international relations in the Northeast Asian region. The central theme of this course is to estimate whether the region can move forward toward peace and common prosperity or into a more conflicted and uncertain situation in international political and economic relations.</p> <p>In the first part of this course, to understand Northeast Asian international relations, basic knowledge of the core concepts and theories of international relations is acquired, and the possibility of reconstructing these into theories considering the unique characteristics of Northeast Asia is reviewed.</p> <p>The second part examines the history of international relations in Northeast Asia from ancient times to the present to grasp the historical context of current Northeast Asian international relations.</p> <p>The third part examines the causes and expected effects of US-China competition, which can be said to be the foremost factor in the current dynamics of international relations in Northeast Asia, from the security and international economic perspectives. Economic security issues, China's Belt and Road, and the United States Indo-Pacific strategy will be addressed here.</p> <p>The fourth part studies the North Korean nuclear issue, Korea-Japan, Korea-China, and China-Japan relations. Controversial issues such as territorial disputes and historical issues that greatly affect these countries' relationships are also covered.</p> <p>The fifth part examines the situation and prospects of economic integration in East Asia by expanding its geographical scope to East Asia</p>				

		<p>and the Pacific region, including Southeast Asia. And finally, to evaluate the status of Northeast Asia in the world and to predict the future, the challenges that Northeast Asia will face and the prospects for solving or overcoming them will be discussed.</p> <p>In the 13-week class, students take on the role of foreign minister of one of the major Northeast Asian countries, set possible goals for policies that are the highest priority for the realization of their country's interests, and conduct interactive simulations to achieve the goals. will be. In other words, Students will simulate how goals can be achieved in complex international relationships and, if necessary, how to negotiate with partners.</p>		
	<b>Course Objective</b>	Students acquire basic knowledge and theories on international relations in Northeast Asia and develop critical thinking skills regarding security, diplomacy, and economic relations in the region.
