	<b>Course Description</b>	This course is designed to introduce students to international relations in Northeast Asia in the Post-Cold War era and analyze many of the current issues in the region. The topics to be covered in this course include, but are not limited to: the traditional structure of international relations in the region; the rise of China; the two Koreas, and Japan; the role of the U.S; North Korea's nuclear crises; and a new international order in East Asia. The emphasis will be on the current developments in political and security realms.

Acquire the ability to analyze the main points of conflict and cooperation in Northeast Asia, and the key roles that outside actors play; (3) to be able to analyze the past, current, and future challenges the region is faced with.
