	<b>Course Description</b>	<p>This course is an overview of international relations in the East Asian region. The central theme of this course is to estimate whether the region can move forward toward peace and common prosperity or into a more conflicted and uncertain situation in international political and economic relations. In the first part of this course, to understand East Asian international relations, basic knowledge of the core concepts and theories of international relations is acquired, and the possibility of reconstructing these into theories considering the unique characteristics of East Asia is reviewed. The second part examines the causes and expected effects of US-China competition, which can be said to be the foremost factor in the current dynamics of international relations in East Asia from the security and international economic perspectives. Economic security issues, China's Belt and Road, and the United States Indo-Pacific strategy will be addressed here. The third part studies the North Korean nuclear issue, Korea-Japan, Korea-China, and China-Japan relations. Controversial territorial disputes and historical issues significantly affecting these countries' relationships are also covered. The fourth part examines the situation and prospects of economic integration in East Asia and the Pacific region, including Southeast Asia. Finally, to evaluate the status of East Asia in the world and to predict the future, the challenges that East Asia will face and the prospects for solving or overcoming them will be discussed.</p>
