|                            | <b>Course Description</b>  | <p>This course offers an overview of the theoretical and empirical discussion on International Relations. This course will construct the foundation of scholarly and policy analysis on the current issues of IR. The topics covered will help a student have a fair amount of methodological and theoretical training. |                            | <b>Course Objective</b>    | <p>This course is considered a gateway course for all other international relations classes and a fundamental element of the undergraduate. The aim is for students to begin to learn the literature in the field and the intellectual issues and debates. In each class, there will be two sections.</p> <p>1) There will be a lecture section. In this section, the lecturer provides his own analysis on the given readings and explanation for the issues. And students are supposed to answer to the question from the lecturer once her/his name is called. (Cold Call) The list of questions will be provided in advance. If the students give a 'proper' answer to the question, she/he will gain a point for the in-class participation.
